



In January, Mom (Hazel Palmer) gave you some of the factual history of our church. I'm going to talk a little about our church in the beginning from a 14yr old's perspective. But first, I need to tell you a little of my history. My mom's parents had a working farm with chickens, pigs, bees, apples trees and a big garden. There was nothing more fun for me than spending 2 weeks every summer with them. During these 2 weeks, we would always go to Bible School at their church. Mountain View Mennonite Church. That is where I learned a lot about the Bible from completing workbooks to memorizing Bible verses to reciting those verses at the Program held at the end.

I had always attended Fairview Christian Church with my mom & dad. Because of what and how much I had learned in Bible School my grandparents, the other kids in Sunday School would give me a hard time. Plus the fact that I was not attending with the kids I went to school with made me a little more uncomfortable. And as you know, teenagers don't like to be singled out or made fun of.

When mom and dad took me to the first meeting of Timberlake Christian Church at Brookville High School (Sept 1968), I was very excited to see some of the kids I knew from school. We starting attending every Sunday and I was feeling very much "at home" with everyone. The classrooms at school were transformed to classrooms for church and the auditorium was transformed into our church sanctuary. When January of the next year rolled around and the charter for TCC was going to be closed, I knew where I wanted to go to church. I had no idea what mom & dad were planning on doing, but I told them that my name was going on that charter. I didn't care what they did, this was where I wanted to be. Fortunately, they followed me. Youth groups started up taking turns meeting in each other's homes. We, also, had a youth choir.

I was a senior in high school when we had the ground breaking hear at this location and was very excited to be getting our own place to meet. Once we were in our church building, Gerald and I (with the help of mom & dad) purchased several wooden benches for the youth classroom which we had to stain and finish. I think there is still one of those benches left downstairs in front what used to be the bell room.

From the time I was 14 until even now, I have always and continue to feel like this place is home.

I am very excited about our plans for our 50th anniversary celebration. We are planning dinners and activities for the whole weekend.
